




## **September**

## All Are Welcome by Alexandra Penfold

This lesson teaches children that everyone belongs and is valued in the school community, regardless of their background, appearance, or abilities. It promotes acceptance and belonging by showing diverse children learning, playing, and celebrating together.

#### Tools

- Understanding that everyone belongs.
- Appreciating diversity.
- Practicing ways to welcome and include others.



## **October**

## The Day of the Dead by Bob Barner

This lesson introduces the Day of the Dead as a joyful, colorful, and family-centered holiday that honors and remembers loved ones who have passed away. It emphasizes that it's a celebration, not a sad occasion, highlighting traditions like altars, marigolds, and sugar skulls.

#### Tools

- Learning about the cultural significance of the Day of the Dead
- Understanding different ways to remember and celebrate loved ones.
- Appreciating cultural differences in traditions.




#### **November**

## Join in and Play by Cheri J. Meiners

#### Tools

- Developing positive peer relationships through inclusive play.




## **January**

## Talk and Work it Out by Cheri J. Meiners

This lesson teaches children specific tools and steps for peaceful conflict resolution. It focuses on verbalizing problems, actively listening, brainstorming solutions, and choosing the best plan, while emphasizing respect for others' feelings and perspectives.

#### Tools

- Step-by-step process for resolving conflicts peacefully.
- Identifying and expressing their own feelings and recognizing feelings in others.
- Practicing active listening and empathetic understanding.




## **February**

#### Hair Love by Matthew Cherry

This lesson uses the story of Zuri and her dad styling her hair to celebrate self-love, acceptance, and the beauty of natural hair. It highlights the loving bond between father and daughter and affirms individual differences, promoting the idea that uniqueness is a superpower..

#### Tools

- Celebrating their own uniqueness and individual appearance.
- Appreciating diverse hairstyles and personal expressions.
- Understanding the value of self-love and perseverance.




### March

**Quinitos Neighborhood by Ina Cumpiano** This lesson introduces children to a vibrant community through Quinito, who knows and values all the people and their contributions in his neighborhood. It highlights diverse community helpers and their important jobs, emphasizing interconnectedness and how everyone contributes to making a place special.

#### Tools

- Learning about different people and jobs within a community.
- Understanding the importance of neighbors and how they help each other.
- Appreciating the diverse roles and contributions that make a neighborhood special.



# April Be Polite and Kind by Cheri J. Meiners

This lesson emphasizes the significance of good manners, courtesy, respect, and kindness in daily interactions. It guides children to understand that these behaviors make everyone feel comfortable, valued, and happy, fostering positive relationships and a harmonious environment.

#### Tools

- Understanding the importance of politeness and kindness.
- Learning and practicing "magic words" (please, thank you, excuse me).
- Recognizing how polite and kind actions affect others.
